New Turret Punch Arrives At Albert Jagger's

We recently took delivery of our new 30 tonne turret punch. Prior to arriving in Christchurch our machine was displayed at the EMEX machinery show in Auckland.

The machine weighs 15 tonnes and needed careful manoeuvring during installation.



The new turret press will significantly increase our ability to quickly produce extremely accurate sheet metal components.

The Cad Cam software coupled with the speed of the machine enables us to programme and complete complex jobs with greater efficiency.

Some features of this press include the ability to use Wilson Wheeling tools to swage mild steel up to 2 mm thick, and stainless steel to 1.5mm. Scribing tools enable us to put part numbers or logos on components.

Lyttelton museum

We recently manufactured this steel staircase for City Care, and installed it behind the Lyttelton Museum.

The installation was a tricky operation because the alleyway in which it was placed is only 1.5 meters wider than the stair. Thanks to some superb crane operating by Titan cranes the job went smoothly.
